TOPIC - MEANING OF HOLDING COMPANY

Meaning of Holding Company

A holding company is a company that controls one or more other companies by owning a majority of their shares or by having the power to control their management and policies. The companies that are controlled by the holding company are known as subsidiary companies. The main purpose of a holding company is not to produce goods or services directly but to manage, supervise, and control other companies. According to corporate law, a company is considered a holding company when it exercises control over another company in any of the following ways: by holding more than half of the total voting power, by controlling the composition of the board of directors, or by exercising significant influence over business decisions. This relationship creates a parent–subsidiary structure within a corporate group.

The holding company usually owns shares in its subsidiaries and earns income through dividends, interest, or capital gains rather than through direct business operations. It may also provide strategic guidance, financial support, and managerial supervision to subsidiary companies. Through centralized control, the holding company ensures uniform policies and coordinated decision-making among group companies.

One important feature of a holding company is control without full ownership. It is not necessary for the holding company to own 100% of the shares; even majority ownership or effective control is sufficient. This allows businesses to expand operations and diversify investments while maintaining legal separation between different entities.

Holding companies are often formed for purposes such as expansion, risk management, tax planning, and efficient administration. By separating businesses into subsidiaries, financial risks of one company do not directly affect the others. This structure also helps in better allocation of resources and specialized management.

However, despite control by the holding company, subsidiary companies remain separate legal entities with their own rights and liabilities. Each company maintains its own accounts and legal identity, although

consolidated financial statements may be prepared to present the overall financial position of the corporate group.
